

To our knowledge there is only one other case of Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) associated epithelioid granuloma of the nasopharynx described in the English literature. An explanation for the occurrence of the lesion in this particular region is yet to be discovered.Q: How to share secrets in node.js (server) with a frontend Angular client (browser)? I have a Node.js server, and a frontend Angular (browser) client. On the server, I have a module that has a secret that's going to be used in the client's call to the server. So, for example, the user logs in, and the server sets a token in the session. The session token is only valid for a minute, and is going to be sent to the client along with every request to the server. Now, the server needs to send this token to the client, and the client needs to send the token to the server. Obviously, I don't want the client to send the token to the server. If the secret was stored in the client-side javascript file (which I imagine we would be able to just include in the dist folder of the client), then the server would be able to see the token. Is there any way for the client to be able to have the secret, but not send it to the server? I'm thinking of running this in an Electron app, but I don't know how secure I'd be able to make that, and I'm not convinced that an Electron 82157476af

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
